

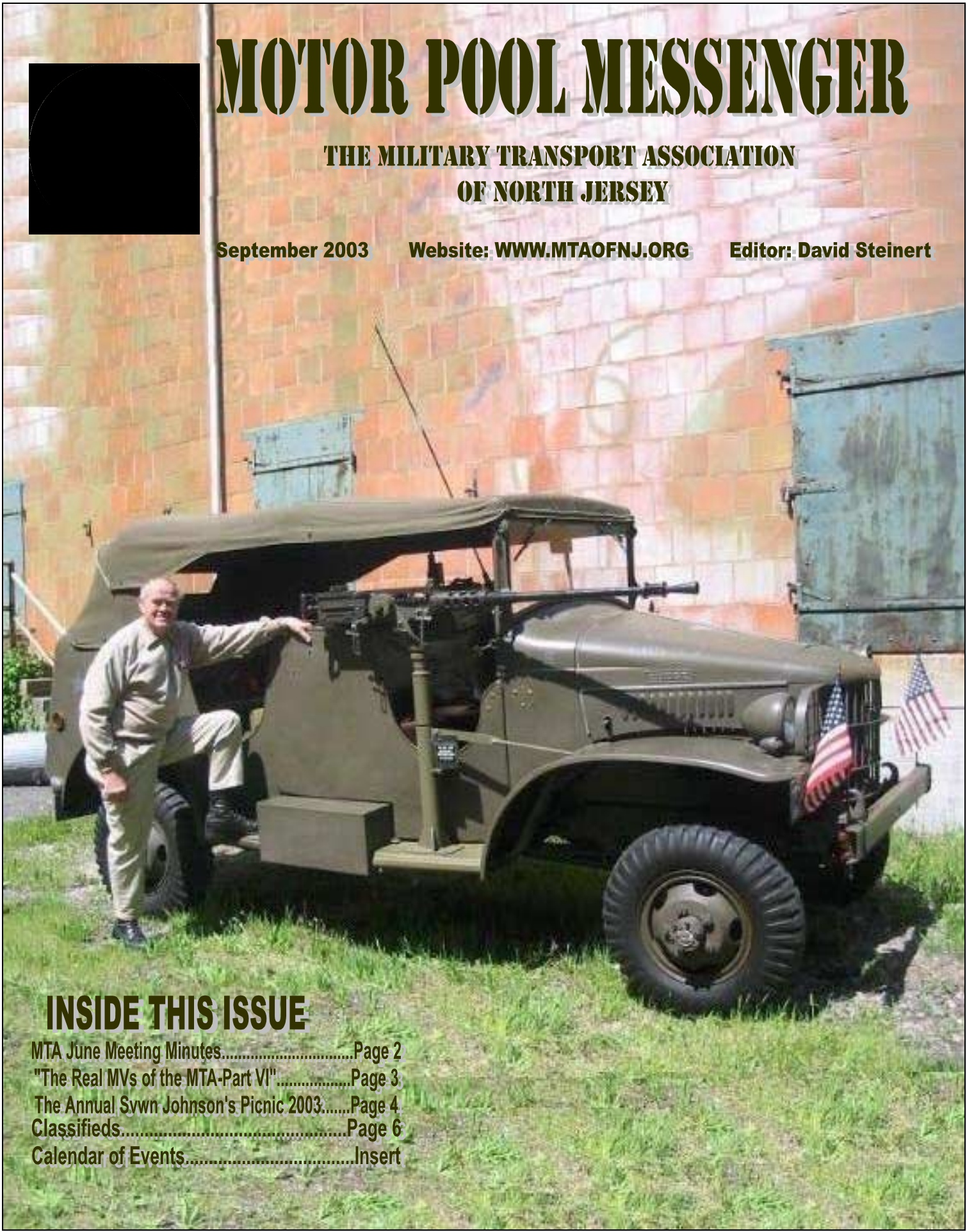

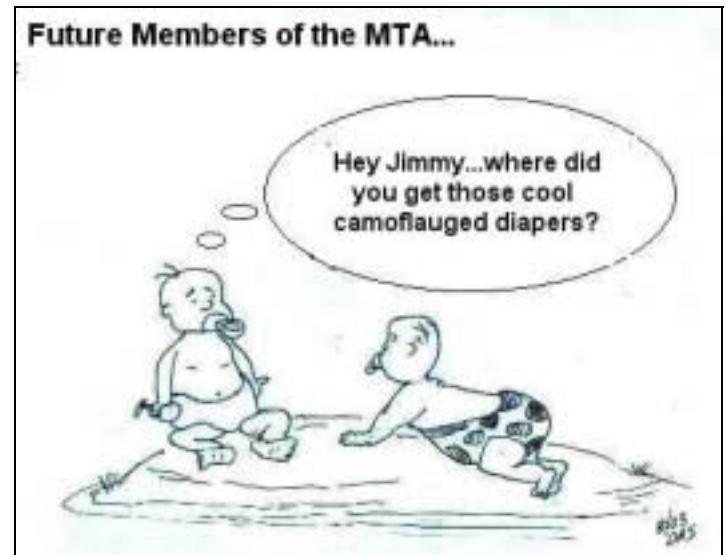

The Real MVs of the MTA-Part VII

The *Motor Pool Messenger* continues its tribute to the real MVs (Military Veterans) of the MTA.

The MTA salutes Jack White of Union, NJ. In June of 1950, North Korean troops invaded the Republic of South

Korea without warning. By July, US ground troops are sent to Korea and the United States enters another unresolved conflict. It was July 21st 1952 when Jack received his draft notice from Uncle Sam. At the time, Jack was 19 years old and was working as a machine operator for a company in Union, NJ. The draft notice instructed him to report to the Induction Center in Newark. At the Induction Center it was determined that Jack would be assigned to the army. He was immediately bused to Camp Kilmer in New Brunswick, NJ where he was indoctrinated in the ways of the armed forces. After a week at Camp Kilmer, he was bused to Fort Dix, NJ for 8 weeks of basic training. At Fort Dix, Jack would get an additional 8 weeks of advanced basic training where he becomes very familiar with the Browning Automatic Rifle (BAR) and M1 carbine.

In November of 1952, Jack boards the USNS General Simon B Buckner for an 11-day boat trip with his final destination being Inchon, Korea. The Korean War was now in it's third year. Peace talks were at a stalemate. Jack arrives in Korea and is assigned to the 45th Infantry Division. For three months he is assigned to guard

duty at a POW camp in North Korea watching over captured Red Chinese and North Korean soldiers. In February of 1953, Jack was moved to the frontlines near the 38th Parallel that now divides North and South Korea. It was now winter in Korea and temperatures would consistently be well below zero with one to two feet of snow on the ground. Jack would spend these dark days and nights trying to keep warm in a foxhole. Uncle Sam had provided him with warm clothing and he fondly remembers wearing the wonderful "Mickey Mouse" boots that used two layers of rubber with an air cushion in between to keep his feet nice and warm and sweaty. During these months on the frontlines, the North Koreans would overrun the 45th Infantry Division's position several times, killing and wounding American soldiers caught off guard. Jack remembers many a sleepless night in his foxhole fighting off the infiltrating North Korean soldiers.

Then on July 27th 1953, the United States signs an Armistice with North Korea. It was 10 PM and Jack recalls sitting in his foxhole when the news arrived about the cease-fire. For the next 2-1/2 weeks Jack was assigned to Graves Registration to assist in the collection of the American dead who were killed in recent battles. A morbid detail that Jack would rather forget. He was than rewarded with two weeks of "R&R" (Rest and Recuperation) in Tokyo, Japan.

After his two week "vacation" in Tokyo, Jack returned to South Korea where he was assigned as a motor pool Sergeant for the 514th Transportation Truck Company. He recalls many of the vehicles in the motor pool were of WWII vintage. Jack remained with the 514th until June of 1954 when he boarded a ship for a 17 day "cruise" back to the United States. He was discharged from active duty at Camp Kilmer on July 3rd 1954. He remained on inactive duty until his discharge in 1960.



From June 25th 1950 to July 27th 1953, 54,246 Americans died, 33,629 were killed in action. In addition, 228,000 Korean soldiers and untold numbers of civilians, 717 Turkish soldiers, and 1,109 soldiers of the United Kingdom, and many other UN volunteers gave their lives, and over 110,000 American were wounded and MIA.

In 1954, Jack returned to civilian life where he would marry and deliver milk for Schmaltz Dairy in Plainfield, NJ for 12 years. He then worked for the Seven-up Bottling Company in Plainfield as a salesman and deliveryman. He

also worked for Consolidated Cigars before going into the landscaping business before retiring.



Today Jack and his wife, Esther, attend many MTA events in his 1941 Dodge WC-25 Radio Command car. He has been an active member of the MTA for several years.



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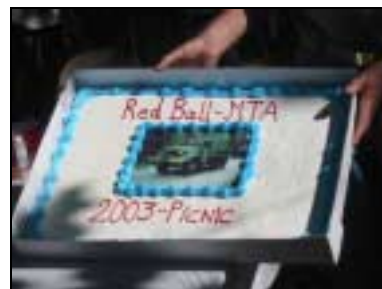
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Samples Publications:
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The 2003 Picnic at Sven's

After a week of oppressive heat and humidity, Saturday, August 23rd 2003 arrived with crystal clear skies and temperatures in the low 80s with no humidity. What a perfect day for a picnic. Members of the Military Transport Association of North Jersey and the Red Ball Express of Eastern Pennsylvania awoke looking forward to their annual picnic hosted by **Sven and Helga Johnson** in Green Township, NJ.

For the last few years, this picnic has become the highlight of the summer for many members of these two military vehicle clubs. Because of the close proximity of the

two MV clubs, many are active members of both organizations. Club members plan their vacations and mark their calendars to make sure they are available to attend this event. Members are encouraged to bring family, friends and military vehicles to the picnic.

Members started arriving at Sven's around 11:30 AM. Some members generously pitched in to help set up tables and chairs under the shade of a huge oak tree. The large grill that would barbecue over 100 chicken halves was soon fired up and the beer keg was pressurized. MTA Vice President **John Sobotka** soon arrived with his deuce and the soda, watermelon and ice were quickly unloaded. Toys and games were provided for the kids. With the grill fired-up, the chicken was now placed on the barbecue for the lengthy cooking process. Over the next hour and half, club members and their families arrived in vintage military vehicles from many different eras. The vehicles were parked under the shade of the apple trees scattered throughout the picnic area. Members greeted each other with enthusiastic introductions and then settled into a comfortable banter of hobby related topics. MTA member **Sheila Zelaskowski**, who just returned from a year in the New Jersey National Guard, was soon surrounded with warm greetings where she shared her "boot camp" experiences with fellow club members. There are many aspects that make this event so unique from other club activities. **Sven Johnson** and his family host the picnic on their 160-acre tree farm in Green Township, New Jersey. The property has a variety of different terrains that provides a perfect opportunity for military vehicle enthusiasts to test their equipment at various stages of difficulty. For club members who want to take it easy on their antique vehicles there are acres of level fields that offer a nice off road but gentle ride that is

MTA members **Gary Shultz, Dave Young, George Wagner** and myself took our jeeps on one of the more overgrown trails. Low range, four-wheel drive was required to transverse some of the steeper and rockier inclines experienced throughout the trail. As we drove deeper into the woods the trail narrowed and it took some tricky maneuvering to avoid any scratching to the body and fenders. All four jeeps escape without any major damage, with only a few minor scratches to vehicles and passengers. It was definitely a great experience for all.

By the time we arrived back to the picnic area, the chow line was formed. There was barbecue chicken, hot dogs, fresh corn-on-the-cob, coleslaw and all the basic condiments. Club members and their families gathered in groups and enjoyed the food, drink and conversation. Some returned for seconds.

With the hunger pains gone and the thirst quenched, it was time for hitting the trails once again. MTA member **John Headley** fired up his nicely restored 1943 White M4 half-track. Having never experienced the ride in a WWII half-track before, I hitched a ride with John as he pulled out of the picnic area. John took the half-track through its gears as he maneuvered his way through the level trails cut into the high-grass of a nearby field. He then made his way into the wooded area where he chose a fairly wide trail and continued to drive deeper into the ever thickening overgrown forest. Luckily I had chosen to sit in the jumper seat situated between the driver and passenger. This turned out to be a good choice as I observed the ducking and weaving that MTA members **Bill Best** and **John Peterson** had to do while sitting back in the mortar section of the vehicle. If not for their quick reactions, the low hanging tree branches would have decapitated them both. As we proceeded further into the woods, John found a clearing where he could maneuver the half-track into a 360 degree turn and head out the way we came in. Just as we were about to exit the woods, John noticed a fairly long but smooth 45-degree incline. Making a quick hairpin turn, he approached the bottom of the incline and stopped to put the half-track into its lowest gear. At this point, John revved the engine and with the releasing of the clutch we roared up the steep incline while **Bill Best** and **John Peterson** hung onto the 80 mm mortar loosely mounted in the back of the half-track. When we reached the top of the hill, we all waited for our recently filled stomachs to settle, before continuing on. Just as we were approaching the picnic area, John maneuvered the half-track through a very muddy area where it bogged down. With engine revving and tracks spinning we slowly made our way back into the picnic area. Where in Disney World can you get a ride like that? Later, John could be seen power washing the mud off of his vehicle.

Without hesitation they jumped in and we made our way back to one of the more wooded trails. On the way we past MTA member **Brian Bancale** with his WWII M8 Armored Car attempting to climb the same incline that John Hedley negotiated earlier with his half-track.

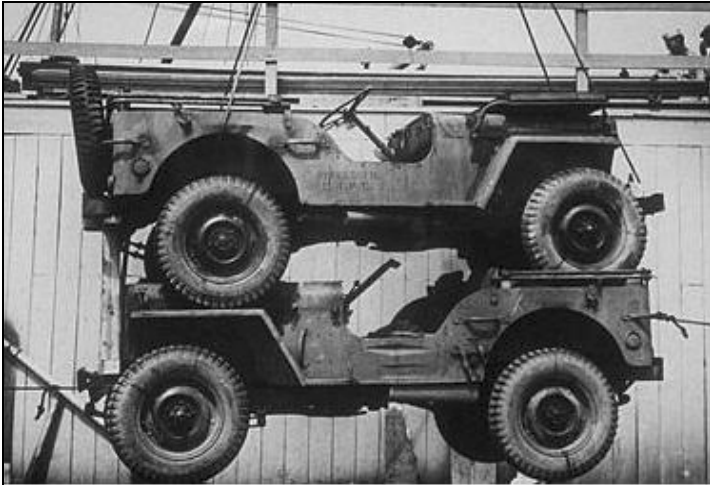
